THE STATES' ROLE IN REVIEWING DATA

The SmartForms aren't just for agencies...





It's in the Act



Each State shall annually prepare and submit to the Secretary a report on the measured performance of the State and the eligible entities in the State.

CSBG Act Section 678E(a)(2) [42 USC § 9917]





Changing The Way We Think About Collecting and Reviewing Data

It is important to change the mindset from...

"We collect data for reporting purposes."

to...

"We collect data to help manage and support the agency's programs and services and determine if we make a difference in our client's lives and in their communities."

AND

"We review the data to ensure agencies are reporting correctly and ultimately fulfilling their missions"





Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 CSBG Annual Reports

- A Complete Submission includes:
 - CSBG Annual Report
 - CSBG CARES Annual Report
 - CSBG Disaster Supplemental Annual Report (as applicable)
- Referred to collectively as the CSBG Annual Reports
- ALL REPORTS Due March 31, 2022

Note: The Reporting Requirements remain the same as last year

What is a Complete Module 2 & 4?

- Submission of all XMLs for all reporting eligible entities
- Submission of the state-level form within GrantSolutions
- Comments clarifying your data (Optional)



Completing Your Modules 2 and 4 Submission

- Upload XMLs for all Reporting Eligible Entities
 - Upload Blank XMLs if:
 - CSBG: if de-designated after October 1, 2020
 - CARES & Disaster: if entity did not expend funds or declined funds
- Submit the state-level form for each Module once all XMLs are Uploaded

If an entity is reported in the State Plan/Application — they must be reflected in the Annual Report





How to Report if No CARES and/or Disaster Funds were Expended?

States:

- CARES: Describe the challenges within Module 1, Section B under the progress update of your Goals (B.1) and/or under Lessons Learned (B.3)
- Disaster Supplemental: All states should have obligated all Stage 1 and Stage 2 funds by September 30

Eligible Entities:

- If an eligible entity declined CARES funds and/or returned Disaster funds:
 - Please note this information in Module 2, A.6 and upload
 - Upload a blank Module 4 XML

Uploading a Blank XML is the state and eligible entity confirming that they did not expend funds





How am I supposed to review this data?

- Review each Module for completeness and accuracy
- Use the color coding and errors and warnings in the SmartForms
- Use the Annual Report checklists
- Go beyond what the SmartForm tells you
 - Compare services to outcomes
 - Outcomes and services to demographics
 - Reported demographics to Census data
 - Total number of people who live in poverty to who was served
 - Total number of people who live in the service area to who was served



FY21 Reporting for A.2 and C.2

- A.2 should stay the same (unless you're a small state that received a second allocation of CSBG CARES funding).
- C.2 will only report carryover and discretion in FY21.
- Example:
 - A.2 and C.2 in FY20 were \$100,000.
 - Agency expended \$40,000 in FY20.
 - In FY21, Agency reports:
 - \$100,000 in A.2
 - \$60,000 in C.2

Outcomes and Indicators

- An outcome represents a specific result a program is intended to achieve
- An indicator is a specific, observable and measurable that can be used to show changes or progress a program (service, strategy) is making toward achieving a specific outcome.
 - There should be at least one indicator for each outcome but there may be several different indicators that all work together to demonstrate the outcome.
 - An indicator helps you follow change over time. It is a way to detect progress or lack of progress toward an outcome.






Services

- A service is what the agency does to achieve the outcome.
- The agency must consider how their services will be connected to a specific indicator, so it can be clearly connected to identified needs and outcomes.
- The identification of services are included in the planning process and are implemented by the agency.
- Not all services will lead to an outcome.





Measurement Tools

- How will you prove an outcome is achieved? (Measurement Tool)
 - Pre- and post-tests
 - Proof from documents (paycheck stubs, bank accounts, report cards, etc.)
 - Personal Reports (client statements)
 - Questionnaire
 - Scales and matrices



Unduplicated Count Definition

Unduplicated Count

An actual count of individuals, families, households, or otherwise identified units whereby each individual, family, household or other unit is only counted one time. For example, if a person enters an agency and receives seven different services, an unduplicated count would record one person, not seven services. In order to obtain unduplicated counts of individuals, an agency will need to have a system to distinguish each individual.
